Employment Committee of the Ann Arbor Conference on Religion Race has appreciated the cooperation given it in the conducting current study of employment conditions for Negroes in Ann Arbor. In interest in the public school system is two-fold. order to understand what we are seeking, it needs to be recogted that many skilled potential Negro teachers become discouraged
communities such as ours because of previous unfavorable expertes elsewhere. No one seeks to be embarrassed, especially retedly. Hence, it follows that many times the only way qualified
to teachers can be hired in a predominately white community is
that community to take the initiative in encouraging applicants
thereby ressure them that they will not be regarded differently

mhasize the word 'qualified'. No one, especially the Negro, to be insulted by patronage, nor do we expect the Ann Arbor college to lower its standards. However, widening the field constant teachers by encouraging Negro applicants from institues such as Cheyney State College, Cheyney, Ps. and Wayne State consisty in Detroit can only serve to maintain the highest standards among teachers in Ann Arbor, and, at the same time, help teach the same community.
